PARENTAL GUIDANCE – KEY STAGE 3

Academic Mentoring Day – A Parent's Guide

"What is an academic mentoring day?"

• An academic mentoring day is an opportunity for you to attend school and meet with your child and their form tutor to discuss their progress over the school year.

"What happens during the day?"

- You should arrive at the school's main reception 5 minutes before your appointment time you will be escorted to your appointment by a sixth form student.
- Your child will deliver a 5 minute presentation on the progress that they have made at school.
- You will get the opportunity to ask questions- these should be directed towards your child in the first instance as they are hosting the session.
- The form tutor will only intervene if anything factually incorrect is said or the student does not know the answer.

"How will students prepare for the mentoring day?"

- The students will have three weeks to prepare their presentation.
- They will use registration time, pastoral sessions, floating periods and homework to prepare their presentations.

"What is good Progress?"

- If a student has made 2 sub-levels of progress over 3 reports then we would consider it good progress.
- Each level is split into 3 sub-levels of progress (eg 4c,4b, 4a) with an "a" higher than a "b"which is higher than a "c".

"How can I ensure my child is preparing?"

- 3 weeks before they should be able to tell you which subjects they are making good progress in.
- 2 weeks before you should be able to see subject-specific targets recorded at the front of their planners these will have been agreed with their subject teachers.
- 1 Week before you should be able to see a written script of what they are intending to say a 5 minute presentation is usually about 2-3 printed pages or 5-6 written pages (approximately 1000 words).
