English	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Weekly spelling homework • 30 minutes reading per week • SPAG homework as per timetable on Learning Platform • Weekly homework tasks based on current schemes of learning 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Y9: two per week linked to current schemes of learning • From October – Y10 and Y11: weekly homework consisting of exam-style questions
Mathematics	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Set twice weekly in all but the lowest sets of each year group • One homework to be done in half termly produced booklets of legacy questions • One homework to be on Mathswatch or using module homework booklets with answers written in exercise books • Revision homeworks to be set during revision periods 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Set twice weekly in all but the lowest sets of each year group • One homework to be done in half termly produced booklets of legacy questions • One homework to be on Mathswatch, using module homework booklets with answers written in exercise books or a past paper • Revision homeworks to be set during revision periods and the frequency of past paper exercises to be increased near PPE and exam periods
Science	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 1 active revision homework before each end of topic test and a minimum of 1 homework after the end of topic test by way of follow up • Weekly brief science homework e.g. learn/spell key words, research 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • GCSE: weekly on average 2 homeworks; one learning and one application of knowledge. There should be pre and post end of topic test homework. <i>Flipped homework to be used to cover the additional content with Y10 and Y11</i>
Modern Foreign Languages	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Weekly homework (written, learning, research, Pearson Active Learn assignments, preparation for Progress Tests) 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Weekly homework (use is made of Pearson Active Learn for reading/listening/exam practice)
Design Technology	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Weekly homework e.g. making use of homework booklets, preparing ingredients, some written questions, etc. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Weekly homework in all disciplines. Note that some tasks may stretch over a number of weeks (e.g. research, preparation, written work. Where this is the case a weekly note will be written into planners

Physical Education		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Weekly homework set, including past paper questions, research, planning etc. as identified in the PoL. This may also take the form of a specification work book Additional small learning homework set each week, to be tested as a starter in the following lesson
Computing	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Computing: set weekly – this is preparation for the next lesson which students bring and use in the next lesson and is not marked. Revision for progress tests, etc. All work and homework to be done electronically including feedback from teacher in purple and student needs to have developed work or commented back 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Computing: Set weekly – homework most weeks in preparation for written parts of the course. At times the weekly homework will be revision, research or problem solving NOcN: Homework to be set every two weeks to make improvement on project work based on teachers feedback to project
Health and Social Care		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Weekly – alternating weeks <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 1 x set task - 1 x independent learning
Drama	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Once a week – no more than 30 minutes. Often homework that prepares the student for the next lesson. Variety of written and thinking homeworks. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Set weekly- Written homework most weeks in preparation for written parts of the course. At times the weekly homework will be learning lines or rehearsing.
Music	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Homework will be set in the 3 weeks leading up to progress tests. This will be active revision for progress tests. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Weekly homework - A variety of homework will be set weekly ranging from active learning for progress tests and practising performance work.
